





Grade 5/6 News!

Another busy week in the Grade 5/6 class. We have lots of visits by animals in our Speaking and Listening program, from kittens, puppies, horses and even a rat! We have been continuing to highlight our emerging skills in oral language by developing techniques in aivina speeches, presentina information, reading aloud and using expression when reading plays.

A big 'push' this term has been on providing detailed summaries of texts, using evidence and supporting details from texts read. Currently students are completing their picture book review where they have not only analysed the books they have chosen but also the structures with which they present their written review. You can support this learning by encouraging your child to continue reading for a minimum of thirty minutes each night and it would be great if parents could check their child's understandings by asking them to give a detailed summary of what they have read to you afterwards.

In Numeracy we are continuing to work our awareness of decimals, particularly place value and ordering and rounding decimals to the nearest whole numbers.

We have been looking at positive characteristics in ourselves and others and highlighting and celebrating these important traits. We recognize how important it is to be kind but also to be compassionate. courageous, hopeful and enthusiastic and inclusive of others. We can highlight examples of these traits by giving compliments to others and that has been a big focus this week.

Help us find the **Ghost Fish**

Flat-headed Galaxias





Flat-headed Galaxias (Galaxias rostratus) are a Critically Endangered small-bodied fish species which have suffered a severe decline in numbers and range.

Fish ecologists affectionately call this species 'the Ghost Fish' as very little is known about it. If it's spotted in a billabong or farm dam, which is extremely rare, by the time researchers arrive to investigate, it has disappeared!

One of the threats to this often overlooked and understudied species is a lack of data to help us understand their distribution and ecology.

The power of eDNA

Environmental DNA (eDNA) is a special way of monitoring for aquatic species. It involves collecting a water sample, which may contain DNA from a certain species (e.g. from tissue, faeces, urine, eggs etc.). The sample is filtered, and the filter paper is preserved and analysed in a lab with specialised equipment that can detect DNA.

eDNA is a powerful tool when it comes to searching for the Ghost Fish.

eDNA is a great way of detecting this mysterious fish in places where other survey methods cannot, and it removes the chance that it may be misidentified as a similar species, since every species has a unique genetic

NSW Fisheries have developed a species-specific eDNA probe for Flat-headed Galaxias, which has been validated by the Arthur Rylah Institute. It is ready to use, now we just need the water samples!



How you can help

We are seeking volunteers to collect water samples from specific sites in the North Central region of Victoria (see map on next page).

Contact citizenscienceteam@nccma.vic.gov.au to express your interest. You will then be set up with a site near you, equipment, and instructions to collect a water sample and send it back for eDNA testing.
